**Sweet Bay (shrub form)**

*Laurus nobilis* '(shrub form)'

Height: 6 feet

Spread: 4 feet

Sunlight: ○ ●

Hardiness Zone: 7

Other Names: Bay Laurel, Bay Leaf

**Description:**

A rounded to pyramidal, aromatic, evergreen shrub, with leathery, glossy dark green leaves commonly used as a culinary herb; may be pruned to any shape and size; great as a hedge, screen, or container plant; an excellent houseplant

**Features & Attributes**

Sweet Bay (shrub form)'s attractive glossy oval leaves remain green in color throughout the year on a plant with an oval habit of growth. It features subtle chartreuse flowers at the ends of the branches from early to mid spring.

This is a multi-stemmed houseplant with a shapely oval form. This plant can be pruned at any time to keep it looking its best.

**Planting & Growing**

When grown indoors, Sweet Bay (shrub form) can be expected to grow to be about 6 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 4 feet. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 60 years. This houseplant will do well in a location that gets either direct or indirect sunlight, although it will usually require a more brightly-lit environment than what artificial indoor lighting alone can provide. It does best in average to evenly moist soil, but will not tolerate standing water. The surface of the soil shouldn't be allowed to dry out completely, and so you should expect to water this plant once and possibly even twice each week. Be aware that your particular watering schedule may vary depending on its location in the room, the pot size, plant size and other conditions; if in doubt, ask one of our experts in the store for advice. It is not particular as to soil type or pH; an average potting soil should work just fine.
